

Administrative Appeals Process

Administrative Appeal: A formal request to a higher authority to review and overturn a decision made by an administrative agency. The process is governed by statutes, agency rules, and procedural safeguards to ensure fairness. Key purpose is to correct errors, address procedural defects, or reconsider factual findings. Related terms: Agency Decision, Judicial Review, Appeal Rights.

Administrative Appeal Board: A designated body, often within the agency, that hears and decides appeals of agency actions. Boards may consist of senior officials or independent members and must operate impartially. Their decisions can be final or subject to further judicial review.
