Reproductive Rights and International Law

Altruistic Surrogacy

Related terms: commercial surrogacy, surrogate mother

A form of surrogacy where the carrier receives no financial profit beyond reasonable expenses. Example: A woman volunteers to carry a sibling for a childless couple. Practical application includes drafting a non-compensatory agreement. Challenges involve distinguishing genuine altruism from hidden compensation and ensuring legal enforceability.

Assisted Reproductive Technology (ART)

Related terms: in-vitro fertilisation, gamete donation

Medical interventions that aid individuals in achieving conception, including IVF, ICSI, and embryo cryopreservation. Example: A couple uses IVF after tubal factor infertility. Practical application: Clinics must comply with national licensing and reporting standards. Challenges include ethical debates over embryo status and cross-border service provision.

Artificial Reproductive Technology (ART)

Cross-Border Surrogacy

Declaration on the Rights of the Child

Embryo Adoption

Embryo Donation

Embryo Transfer

Family Law

Related terms: marital law, child protection

Fertility Preservation

Genetic Testing

Human Rights Law

Informed Consent

International Surrogacy Forum

Uterine Transplant

Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR)

Violence Against Women
